



BACKGROUND AND MISSION

In 2003, former U.S. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright founded the Aspen Ministers Forum to strengthen diplomatic ties between the U.S. and Europe. The group quickly grew into a global network of former Foreign Ministers working together on the world's toughest challenges. Today, under the guidance of former Secretary Hillary Rodham Clinton, it is a trusted space for honest conversations and practical ideas to help solve international problems.

APPROACH

The Aspen Ministers Forum is a nonpartisan initiative made up of former Foreign Ministers from around the world. They meet regularly—both in person and online—to focus on major global issues, whether it's a fast-moving crisis or a long-term challenge. Their conversations are off the record and deeply informed, drawing on members' decades of experience in diplomacy, negotiation, and policymaking. These meetings often influence the work of current leaders and institutions. The Forum has expanded its reach with digital tools—hosting virtual sessions and creating public content—to share key insights more widely.

WHAT MAKES THE ASPEN MINISTERS FORUM UNIQUE?

- The Aspen Ministers Forum provides high-level policy guidance to governments, international organizations, and NGOs.
- AMF members bring the Forum's insights back to nearly two dozen countries, where they brief top government leaders, shape policy decisions, and share key findings through articles, public talks, and media appearances.
- The group frequently hosts and engages with senior government and international officials, allowing them to speak candidly in a private, off-the-record setting, forge new relationships, and apply lessons learned in their roles as world leaders.
- The AMF is a preeminent platform with the ability to regularly convene 20-25 former Foreign Ministers of diverse nationalities and political perspectives that remain engaged and influential on the world stage.

IMPACT

The AMF serves as a powerful platform for raising the profile of critical global issues and offering practical, innovative solutions. Following meetings, members publish public letters and opinion editorials in major news media outlets around the world both individually and collectively. Often, the Ministers' joint signatures make articles and letters more powerful and result in the pieces being more widely read and discussed across the world. These pieces have been included in a wide range of publications, including The New York Times, The Washington Post, Al-Ahram Weekly, Le Monde, Spiegel Online, and the Financial Times, among others. Beyond public discourse, the Ministers maintain private channels with heads of state and high-ranking officials, providing direct, high-level counsel. AMF meetings have also produced private letters and in- person conversations with UN Secretary-General António Guterres. During the meeting with the Secretary-General, several AMF members presented insights and policy recommendations from recent forums. The Ministers are committed to taking the ideas that come out of these convenings back to their respective communities.
